GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Membership – Annual membership fee is \$7 for Adults (18 and older), \$3 for Juniors (17 & under), if Junior Members wish to exhibit in Senior classes they will pay an additional \$4. Members are entitled to one day free admission to the Fair (Card to be turned in upon entrance to the Fair)
2. Admission- Daily admission to the Fair as follows: \$5 per adult/senior, \$4 for Students & Youth (13 to 17), \$2 for Children (7-12). Children 6 and under are free when accompanied by an adult.
3. Exhibitors- All exhibitors must be members of the Society, except exhibitors in the School Fair Section. Memberships must be purchased by exhibitors prior to the commencement of judging. Competition for prizes is open to all, irrespective of residence, unless otherwise specified.
4. All exhibitors acknowledge and agree to abide by these rules and regulations, unless otherwise stated.
5. Unless otherwise stated: every animal, fowl, article, product and chattel exhibited must be the actual bonafide property and absolutely belong to the persons entering and exhibiting the same, and in the case of every article, product and chattel exhibited, the said article, product or chattel must be the actual production, growth or manufacture, and, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning and exhibiting the same.
6. Use the online exhibitor link when at all possible. All entry forms for exhibitors must reach the Office no later than Wednesday, August 8th, 2018 unless otherwise specified in certain classes (exhibitor tickets will be mailed). Any forms left at office after this date will be picking up their exhibitor tickets when dropping off their entries. Late entries may be accepted at discretion of the committee chair. On admittance to the Fairgrounds, exhibitor must give their name and address and the kind of stock exhibited to the Secretary, who will issue a ticket identifying the appropriate Class and Section and/or a number to be put on each animal or article for exhibition.
7. No exhibitor is allowed to make more than 2 entries in the same section of any class except where specified (woodcraft, art or livestock- check individual sections for more information).
8. Entry fees- from each exhibitor who has been awarded cash prizes of \$5 or more, 15% of prize money will be retained by the Fair Board in lieu of entry fees.
9. All articles for exhibition in the Hall must be placed in the Exhibition Hall for judging by Wednesday, August 15th between 6 and 8 pm. Exhibit displays will be arranged by the Fair Committee only.
10. Exhibit Hall will be locked at 430pm on Sunday, August 19, 2018 and the door will be opened at 5pm for removal of exhibits as soon as possible. No articles or exhibits may be removed from the Exhibition Hall before that time.
11. Livestock exhibitors must be on the grounds by 10am the day of their class unless otherwise specified.
12. No person or persons will be allowed in the show room during the inspections of the Judges, except officers appointed by the Board of Directors to attend them.
13. Decisions of the Judges shall be final. No appeals will be considered.

14. No person or persons will be allowed to interfere with Judges while engaged in making their awards or afterwards, either by conversation or under any pretence, under forfeiture of all prizes to which they might otherwise be entitled and will also be promptly excluded from the competition.
15. Protest may be made against regularity of breach of rules by any exhibitor or interested party. Protest must be filed on the day of judging. Any person making such a protest will be required to deposit with the Treasurer the sum of \$25, and if the protest is not sustained, the said deposit will be retained by the Society. The President and Vice Presidents shall be a committee to decide on the protest.
16. Worthy exhibits- in sections of classes where there are not two or more exhibits, the Judges shall be empowered to award a second, third or no prize where they consider the exhibit does not merit a first prize. No additions can be made after registration closes.
17. While the Directors of the Society will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of life and property at the exhibition, the Society declares that it is strictly understood that exhibitors and others attend the exhibition at their own risk. Should any article be accidentally injured, burned, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power for recovery, but they will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or portion thereof, and the Society will not be responsible for anyone being injured in any way on the grounds.
18. The Society will use due diligence to ensure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds, but under no circumstances will the Society be responsible for loss, injury, or damage by fire, lightening, wind or by any other agency to such livestock or articles on exhibition or display, and the Fair and Management thereof shall be indemnified by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings related thereto.
19. All livestock and poultry shall be free of disease and accompanied by a certificate of health or vaccination, if applicable and subject to Veterinarian's inspection, who has the power to remove the exhibit.
20. All exhibitors bringing livestock onto the Fair Grounds must provide to the Secretary, upon request, proof of liability insurance in the amount of 2 (two) million dollars. All livestock shall be properly secured by the owner/exhibitors.
21. No grade animal will be allowed to compete in a pure-bred class. Certificates of registration or pedigrees of cattle, horses, sheep and goats must be produced and checked prior to the judging if requested by the officials.
22. Commercial Exhibits- Parties having articles for sale will be allowed on the grounds after paying a concession fee as set by the Concessions Committee and approved by the Board. Gate passes for commercial exhibitors will be issued by the Concessions Committee and will be required for admission to the Fair Grounds.
23. All exhibitors and concessionaires must obtain from the Society and sign a "Hold Harmless" agreement, absolving the Dunnville Agricultural Society of any liability arising from any injuries or accidents that might occur during the Fair.
24. Notice is hereby given that the Officers of the Society may by their rules and regulations prohibit and prevent theatrical, circus and mountebank performances, exhibitors or show, and may prohibit the sale of cheap jewellery or other inappropriate or offensive articles and no games of chance will be permitted on the grounds or within 300 yards thereof; the Society may

also regulate or prevent the huckstering or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares, or merchandise on the exhibition grounds, or within 300 yards thereof; and any person who, after due notice of such rules and regulations, violates the same may be removed by the Officers, Police or Constables of the Society, and that clauses of the "Agricultural Act 1971" relating thereto, shall enforce.

25. The Dunnville Agricultural Society reserves all rights to its grounds and may restrict or prohibit admittance to the grounds to any person or group of persons without giving reason or such action and further, the Society may refuse the privilege of exhibiting to any individual without disclosing the reasons for such refusal and further, all members, exhibitors and others must place animals, cars, trucks, and exhibits as instructed by the Officials or remove same from the grounds
26. Prizes will be paid by the Treasurer no later than October 31, 2018.
27. In the case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
28. Each exhibitor winning \$10 or more in cash prizes is required to leave \$7 with the Society for Membership for 2019 (and \$3 for Junior). The Office will deduct this fee from the winnings.
29. In case an error occurs in the printing of the prize list, Directors have the power to rectify the same.
30. Livestock and Horse Exhibitors Pass Policy:
 - Livestock Vehicle and Driver: Free
 - One to three animals entered: One attendant
 - Four to six animals entered: Two attendants
 - Over six animals entered: Three Attendants
 - All others must pay admission fees-
 - if passes are not presented at the gate - You Must Pay
 - Extra one day passes are available for purchase

Information in this booklet was accurate at the time of printing. Any last-minute changes, corrections or clarifications are at the discretion of the Dunnville Agricultural Society and take precedence.

Horticulture

1. Membership for students 17 years and under \$3 (see general rules if Junior wishes to show in Senior classes), 18 and over is \$7.
2. One entry only in each section per exhibitor unless otherwise stated (i.e. Woodcraft and Art)
3. All articles exhibited must be the property of the person/persons in whose name they are entered.
4. Entries accepted on Wednesday, August 15, 2018 from 6pm to 8pm at Lion's Park. No entries on Thursday, August 16, 2018 when judging takes place. Exhibitor's removal of items, Sunday, August 19, 2018 at 5pm at Lion's Park.
5. In Home Craft Division and Junior Division classes awards for Most Points. Points are calculated as 1st – 3pts 2nd – 2pts 3rd -1 pt
6. Judges may award prizes to worthy entries only.
7. Secure tags to exhibits. Items without tags will be disqualified
8. Exhibitors are responsible for all containers/carriers etc. required to transport their goods to and from the Fair. The Dunnville Agricultural Society is not responsible for such items.
9. Plaque awarded for most points in horticulture division.
10. Exhibitors are required to supply their own containers for flowers and arrangements, sturdy plants, pints, quarts and baskets where required.
11. Containers will be considered in judging for flowers and arrangements, unless otherwise stated
12. All entries must be grown by the exhibitor. No items are to be commercially grown.
13. No artificial materials to be used in any display, except class where stated.
14. Potted plants must be pot grown and be owned by the exhibitor at least 3 months.

Helpful hints for exhibitors of vegetables

1. **Vegetables and flowers** are judged on quality and uniformity
2. **Cooking onions** do not peel or wash, just remove outer rough skin. Should have no tops.
3. **Sweet Spanish Onions** Do not peel or wash, just remove rough outer skin. Should have no tops
4. **Tomatoes** should be ripe, well matched, firm and free of cracks. Stem should be removed.
5. **Squash**- leave stem attached but trimmed.
6. **Peppers**- leave ½" stem
7. **Cucumbers** should be well matched, over six inches (unless otherwise stated) not over ripe, straight even shaped with blunt ends. Leave ¼" stem.
8. **Cabbage**- some outer leaves removed
9. **Corn** -1/3 of husk all the way down and silk removed, kernels well filled.
10. **Potatoes**- Uniform in size. Brush clean, do not wash.
11. **Carrots**- tops should be removed to ½" above crown. Roots should be cleaned and washed and tap roots left on.
12. **Pumpkins**- stem should be left attached but trimmed

Helpful hints for exhibitors of flowers:

1. Flowers should be free from disease, insect damage and insects.
2. Flowers should have good colour, be fresh, not wilted, uniform in size with strong straight stems.
3. Flowers are to be displayed in suitable containers in both Junior and Senior Classes
4. All flower specimens should have foliage and good stem length.
5. When the list indicates a number of "blooms", it includes buds showing colour.
6. In a spray the buds may be left. Glads- a spike should be measured approximately 20" from bottom floret to the tip of the stem. Spike should be 2/3 flower 1/3 stem. A Glad is best displayed in a narrow container.

ANNUAL: An herbaceous plant which normally completes its cycle of life in one year. To include tender perennials such as pansies, snapdragons, etc. that are plants called 'Annuals' grown as such in the region.

BIENNIAL: An herbaceous plant which requires two growing seasons to complete its normal growth i.e. from seed to seed

PERENNIAL: An herbaceous plant that lives more than 2 years. The stem dies to the ground each fall. For example phlox, delphiniums, peonies, etc.

SPIKE: An upright stem carrying several flower, such as gladiolus and snapdragons.

STEM OR STOCK: A plant structure carrying one or more flowers and buds. It may be branched i.e. sweet peas, primulas and irises.

SPRAY: A branch of plant with a number of flowers, i.e chrysanthemum, climbing and floribunda roses, petunias, etc.

3. "Welcome the Royal Baby" -Miniature arrangement, in suitable container, not to exceed 7" in any direction including container
4. "COFFEE BREAK" – Arrangement using mixed flowers in a coffee mug

6. Cinderella's Ball- Fresh flower arrangement, can be a mix of annuals and perennials, with accessories up to 12" high,

2 tablespoons ground nutmeg

Juice of 2 lemons

Juice of 2 oranges

1 cup brandy or sherry (can use or not use)

* Suet is a solid white animal fat. The best Suet comes from the fat that grows around the kidneys in cows and sheep. You can purchase packages of suet from your local butcher or from the meat department of your local grocery store. It then needs to be coarsely grated to make it ready to use. It also must be kept refrigerated prior to use and used within a few days of purchase, just like meat. You can also substitute lard, shortening, butter, or bacon fat.

Instructions: Trim fat from meat of your choice and discard. In a large heavy pan over medium heat, place meat; cover with water and simmer until the meat is tender. Remove from heat and refrigerate meat in the cooking liquid overnight.

Remove from refrigerator and remove meat from liquid. Remove all fat from top of liquid; discard the fat and reserve the remaining liquid. Separate meat from bones, discard bones. Chop cooked meat into small cubes.

In a large pot, combine meat cubes, beef suet, apples, reserved liquid, sugar, apple cider, molasses, cider vinegar, raisins, cinnamon, cloves, allspice, nutmeg, lemon juice, and orange juice; simmer for 2 hours. remove from heat. Add brandy or sherry and mix together.

It is best to let mincemeat stand at least a couple of weeks before using. I store mine in the refrigerator. Freeze in air-tight containers for longer storage.

Lambs will do better and efforts of washing and blocking will be rewarding. Exhibitors must show in white shirts and black pants.
